A student who gets enrolled in college faces innumerable challenges. The unfamiliar surroundings, pressure to perform, peer pressure, physical changes, career choices, identity formation are just some examples of issues that confront young undergraduates. Though, a majority of students identify the ways to cope with these issues, a number of them struggle for support ending up making unfavorable choices. This affects their academic performance and the ensuing future. So, it is important to provide a stigma-free mainstream service within the academic framework with far-reaching effects. Hence, the Student Mentoring System (SMS) was introduced in Dyal Singh College as per UGC/NAAC guidelines. The counseling and mentoring support was designed to cater to all the students of the college. The challenge was to design a comprehensive program for the whole college paying special attention to those who are in need. At the start of each academic session, Mentor-Mentee groups with about 25 students are formed. Every student is assigned a mentor with whom he/she can discuss any issue of concern or that comes in the way of optimal learning. All faculty members of the college are involved in the process of mentoring. The division is uniform and unbiased. The mentor has chalked out responsibilities to take care of all the mentees such as providing career and personal counseling, making provision of remedial classes, and support the students academically outside the scheduled class hours. The mentor also works for finding out the hidden talent of the students in various aspects of academics, co-curricular, extra-curricular and extra-mural activities so that they can be promoted to do various activities in the concerned area for their holistic development. The students are encouraged to meet their mentors at regular frequencies. The mentor also contacts and meets the parents of his/her mentees to discuss their progress and/ or any other matter, as and when required. To sum up, mentors apply their guidance, experience and expertise in promoting their mentees professionally and personally, through interpersonal engagements. Over the years SMS has resulted in a healthy learning environment in the college, creation of positive communication channels among principal, mentors, mentees and parents. Now, mentoring is a mainstream activity of Dyal Singh College that overarches every department. Mentoring has proved to be highly successful with the following outcomes: 1. Mentors build bridges among their mentees and other stakeholders. 2. Generates a feeling of belongingness among students and results better attendance, lesser dropouts, good psychological health and positive changes reported in the lives of the beneficiaries. 3. Addressing the problematic issues of the personal domain of the student's life has shown an improvement in positive outcomes in personality, interpersonal interactions and academic pursuits as well. 4. The students are well apprised of the institution, the functioning systems, roles-responsibilities, privileges, facilities and opportunities. 5. The overall performance of the student is analyzed by viewing the Academic Mentoring Data Card. There is reported better understanding and dynamics between the students and faculty.

2.5.2 - Reforms initiated on Continuous Internal Evaluation(CIE) system at the institutional level (250 words)

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As a constituent college of Kurukshetra University, Kurukshetra, Dyal Singh College, Karnal strictly follows an internal evaluation system as per its norms. Kurukshetra University guidelines are strictly adhered to with respect to the evaluation process. Continuous Internal Evaluation (CIE) is done on the basis of performance of student in class-tests, marks obtained in assignments, regularity of attendance in classes, participation in different activities like NCC, NSS, YRC, Sports etc. and efforts taken by the student to improve his/her performance over the semester. The college examination cell framed guidelines for conducting the CIE in line with academic calendar of the Kurukshetra University. The internal marks evaluation scheme is conveyed through an orientation program to the students at the beginning of each semester. This allows the students to understand evaluation process. The entire internal evaluation system remains impartial and accurate. The college has reformed the CIE system from faculty centric to student centric. As per the guidelines, the following reforms have been carried out effectively conducting CIE: 1. An academic calendar is prepared on the basis of the university calendar with the CIE dates and displayed on the college as well as departmental notice boards. 2. At the beginning of the each semester, students are informed about the various components of CIE process such as schedule for assignments, presentation and class-tests, syllabus of the course, distribution of marks,

and pattern of question papers. 3. The question papers for internal examination were prepared according to knowledge level using revised Bloom's taxonomy. 4. Scrutiny of the prepared question papers are carried out by HoDs/ Subject experts to ensure quality of the question papers. 5. To ensure proper conduct of formative tests, two invigilators from other subjects are assigned to each hall. Evaluation is done by the course handling faculty members within three days from the date of examination. 6. Evaluated assignments and class-tests are returned to the students for doubt clarifications/ re-correction and identified grievances are redressed immediately. 7. After internal examination, the students are informed the mistakes committed and guided to improve their performance in the university examinations. 8. The evaluated answer scripts at random are verified by HoDs/ Subject experts to ensure the standard evaluation process. 9. Result review meetings are conducted with result analysis and the remedial actions for further improvements are decided after discussion with faculty, HoDs/ Subject experts and Principal. 10. The performances of the students are monitored by the Moderation Committee and the necessary feedback is given to the principal and concerned faculty members. 11. Performances of the students in CIE are used for faculties to identify slow and advanced learners in their respective subjects. Slow learners are encouraged to improve their performances in future by counseling. 12. The marks obtained by the students in CIE are displayed on college as well as departmental notice boards before uploading on the university web portal. 13. Finally, the college upload the CIE marks on the university web portal and subsequently communicate to the parents.

2.5.3 – Academic calendar prepared and adhered for conduct of Examination and other related matters (250 words)

The college prepares an academic calendar as per the scheduled prescribed by the Kurukshetra University, Kurukshetra for implementation of curriculum and participation in extra-curricular and co-curricular activities. As per university rules and regulation, academic activities are run in Dyal Singh College throughout the year. The academic calendar is prepared by college at the beginning of each year after the Principal conducts meetings with IQAC, HODs, coordinators, conveners, examination committee, youth welfare and cultural committee and sports committee members incorporating the events required for the students in the form of extension activities, workshops, seminars, field visits/ educational tours, etc. after a thorough analysis of the feedback taken from the stakeholders from time to time. The prepared academic calendar displays the dates for available working days for admission process, semester wise teaching plans, annual intra collegiate festivals, sports events, winter and summer vacations and public holidays etc. Examination dates are decided by the KU Kurukshetra and intimated to the colleges, which is

also incorporated in the academic calendar. The dates for internal examinations, assignments submissions and presentations for all courses, are decided well in advance and displayed on the college notice boards. Tentative dates of practical exams and viva-voce are also given in academic calendar. The main purpose of fixing these dates in advance is to enable the departments to plan for their own department programmes and events. It also helps the students to plan their academic and extra-curricular activities. Time-table is prepared accordingly by a committee specially constituted for this purpose. The teachers prepare teaching plans according to the academic calendar. The entire syllabus is unitized as per the month-wise availability of teaching days and lesson plans are prepared. As per academic calendar college follows all the related curricular, co-curricular and extra-curricular activities for the better academic work. Besides this, college arranges some curricular and co-curricular actives casually as per the guidelines issued by the State Government of Haryana time to time. The college tries to run all the activities as per the academic calendar but some time due to some unavoidable circumstances some

events scheduled gets changed. These changes are communicated to the students well in advance. The college carries out effective planning to stick to academic calendar. The created timeline allows the students to complete the given syllabi in enough time. The Principal conducts curricular and extracurricular review meetings on regular basis to check the implementation and progress of all the activities in the academic calendar. Based on these review meetings, some changes in schedules of activities are made if required. Further, extra lectures are scheduled to complete the syllabus before university examination. The academic calendar gives particular period to conduct extra-curricular and social activities such as celebration of national and international days, birth and death anniversaries of the national icons, tree plantation to make the students aware about various environment related issues, blood donation camp and other activities conducted by NSS in the college and adopted village.

Best Practice I Title of Practice Environment Awareness Among Students. The Context The students are sensitized for protection of environment by involving them in activities like plantation, quiz, practical solutions like, conservation of water by not wasting it during drinking and in toilets and laboratories, keeping lights and fans off when not in use, making the students aware about declining sex ratio due to activities like female foeticide and social problems like dowry, crime against women and sex discrimination, blood donation in camps and at the time of need. The main aim of the activities is to create a holistic environment for overall development of the students. Implementation To implement the above said initiatives the following activities are performed. The college holds Dewan Anand Kumar Memorial State level quiz contest on environment every year. This practice is going on for the last 27 years. The college also organizes Dewan Anand Kumar Memorial State level Chart and Poster Making competition on environment and rallies are organized against use of polythene bags and other environmental hazardous products. In the college the rain water harvesting systems have been installed to check the loss of rain water and recharge the ground water directly. N.S.S. volunteers of the college perform the activities like collecting road side polythene, cleaning roads and teach villagers to use smokeless fuel efficient chullahs. The students are advised and motivated to put off lights and switch off the fans when going out of class rooms and not to waste papers. In the college the plantation is done on the occasion of all the functions. After the plantation the plants are properly looked after by using tree guards. The students are also motivated and enlightened for conservation of water in the college as well as in their daily life. The Environment Club, Women Development Centre, Legal Literacy Cell and N.S.S. units of the college organize seminars, extension lectures, rallies and other awareness programs on

the issues like declining sex ratio, female foeticide, crime against women and sex discrimination. Evidence of Success The efforts done by the college in the above said aspects produce the students who excel in all the fields of society. The students become the best citizens, administrators, business men, lawyers, doctors, engineers, judges, politicians, academicians and military personnels. All these efforts have been done to inculcate the responsibility of being the good citizens of India. The evidence of success of our efforts is provided by the standing of our students in all the fields of life and in different professions. Problems Encountered and Resources Required In the implementation of this noble practice, no problem is faced by the institution. However, the college gets overwhelming response from the students. Implementation The Blood Donors' Club of the college organizes the Blood Donation Camp every year. In the camp more than 150 units of blood is collected every year on September 9 to mark Founder's Day. The college has given consent to the district administration regarding the donation of blood in emergencies. The donors are made available throughout the year whenever the college is contacted. Evidence of Success The success of this practice can be evaluated by the over whelming response of the students.
